Key Scriptures: Exodus 2:1–12; Acts 7:23–30

Discuss

- 1. When you think of Moses, what comes to mind?
- 2. Pastor Robert said Moses described himself differently than God described him. If you were asked to describe yourself, what would you say?
- 3. How does the Bible describe you? Does your definition of yourself align with what the Bible says? Why or why not?
- 4. Why is our view of ourselves so important to God?
- 5. How might people fail because of their strengths rather than their weaknesses?
- 6. God gave Moses a mission in the middle of the wilderness; have you ever felt like God gave you a mission or ministry? What happened?
- 7. How are you including your family or friends in what God has called you to?
- 8. Take a minute to ask God, "How do You want to use me?" and "Is there someone in my life You want to do something divine for?" If the Lord gives you an answer, share with the group.
- 9. What is the Holy Spirit saying to you through this message?

Takeaway

As we conclude, remember the following:

- We each have a mission from God.
- We each have a ministry from God.
- God wants to use us to perform miracles.
- We can share God's message no matter our backgrounds.

Heavenly Father, thank You that no matter what we have done or what has been done to us, You can use us to do great things just like You used Moses. Please reveal the missions and ministries You have for our lives. Help us lay aside any shame or guilt that tries to keep us from doing what You have called us to. We trust and love You. Leader Tip

One helpful way to encourage conversation with group members is for you to be comfortable with silence. Don't feel obligated to speak whenever there is a pause. Involve everyone by asking questions and then giving them time to respond.

Group Dynamics Idea

This week consider opening your group with a fun icebreaker like "would you rather." In this game you give members a choice between two options and ask which one they prefer! For example, "Would you rather swim with a shark or a crocodile?" (You can search "would you rather" questions on the internet.) This is a casual, lighthearted way to get to know one another. Members may even want to share why they picked one scenario over another. Have fun with this!
